

IECMH COMPETENCIES

The infant and early childhood mental health (IECMH) competency guidelines include a broad range of skills and knowledge that professionals use to support the social, emotional, and relational wellbeing of infants, toddlers, young children and their families. We envision that Nevada professionals demonstrate these competencies in action in the following ways:

- **Self-Awareness** is a fundamental practice in IECMH that shapes our interactions and interventions. Understanding of our own thoughts, feelings, and reactions is crucial when working with infants and young children who are highly attuned to *our* emotional reactions and behaviors. When we are self-aware, we are able to recognize our own biases, emotions, and triggers, which then fosters empathetic, patient, and understanding responses. This awareness helps us be attuned and responsive in our interactions, building meaningful connections and promoting positive outcomes for children and families.
- Cultural Humility is a commitment to lifelong learning and reflection on our cultural beliefs
 and biases. Culturally humble IECMH professionals recognize the unique cultural
 perspectives of each child and family, shaping their experiences and interactions. They
 actively seek to learn from and collaborate with families, valuing their cultural practices
 and beliefs. By engaging in self-reflection and challenging assumptions, these professionals
 create inclusive environments of meaningful connection where all children and families
 feel respected and valued.
- Family Relationships & Dynamics shape a child's development. By promoting secure attachments and supporting positive parent-child interactions, IECMH professionals can help lay the foundation for healthy relationship development in the child's life. Building trusting relationships with families, actively listening to their needs, and providing tailored support and resources strengthen family bonds and create a positive environment for the child's growth and well-being.

INFANT/EARLY CHILDHOOD MENTAL HEALTH ENDORSEMENT®

IECMH Endorsement® is an internationally-recognized credential that highlights and verifies that professionals have specialized training and experience in culturally responsive and relationship-based practice.

The Endorsement categories are defined by the way you work with or on behalf of the IECMH population. Most categories include professionals from a variety of work settings, and each scope of practice consists of people newer to the field, people who have a lifetime of experience, and people who are leaders in the field.




WHAT WE'RE READING
